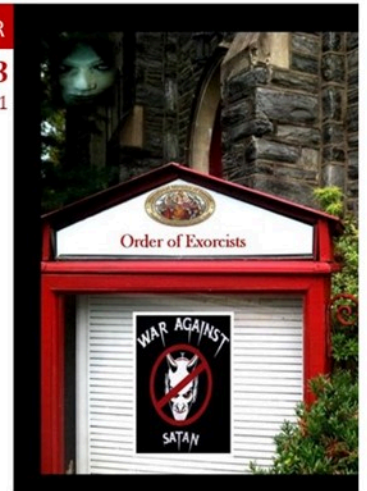


TODAY'S LOOK AT THE PROCESS OF DEMONIC PROFILING
